MENTAL HEALTH



A cross-sectional study in almost 500 adolescents (age = 11-15) found a positive association between social media use and poorer sleep quality, anxiety, and depression; this association was even more pronounced for adolescents who had higher levels of emotional investment in social media.

The mere presence of **smartphones diminishes the attention resources** for engaging with the task at hand. Defined and protected periods of separation from a device is recommended to reduce interruptions and to increase available cognitive capacity.

Observers recorded minute-by-minute activities over a 15-min period and found that participants averaged less than 6 min on their main task before being distracted by technology such as checking their social media and texting with friends.

Dr. Vivek Murthy, the nation's top health official, issued an extraordinary public warning about the risks of social media to young people, citing a "profound risk of harm" to adolescent mental health and urged families to set limits and governments to set tougher standards for use.

LEGISLATION IS IN PROGRESS

Since 2018, legislation increasingly highlights mental health as the main concern when focusing on cell phone use and adolescents.

To date, the UK, the Netherlands, France, Australia, Canada, Israel, California, and Florida and have passed bills that limit or prohibit student cell phone use during school hours.

FAQ: PROCEDURES

What happens in the event of an emergency?

The first priority is always to follow school safety protocol. Students should not be on their phones, but rather following school staff instructions during an emergency. School staff and administrators will have access to their phones and once students are in a safe location, they will be able to quickly open their pouch and use theirs as well.

Do other magnets work on Yondr Pouches?

There are a select few expensive, professional-grade, high-strength magnets that will work on a Yondr pouch. These are typically very hard to come by so it is very uncommon.

What about smartwatches and headphones?

All wearable tech can be placed into the pouch.

- 4th Offense: 3 days of ISS
- **5th Offense:** 1 day of OSS with phone call home



TEACHER AND STAFF EXPECTATIONS

- Monitor students putting electronic devices into pouch
- Check pouches for damages
- Communicate with parents and/or guardians when students are not following guidelines
- Be mindful of their personal use of electronic devices
